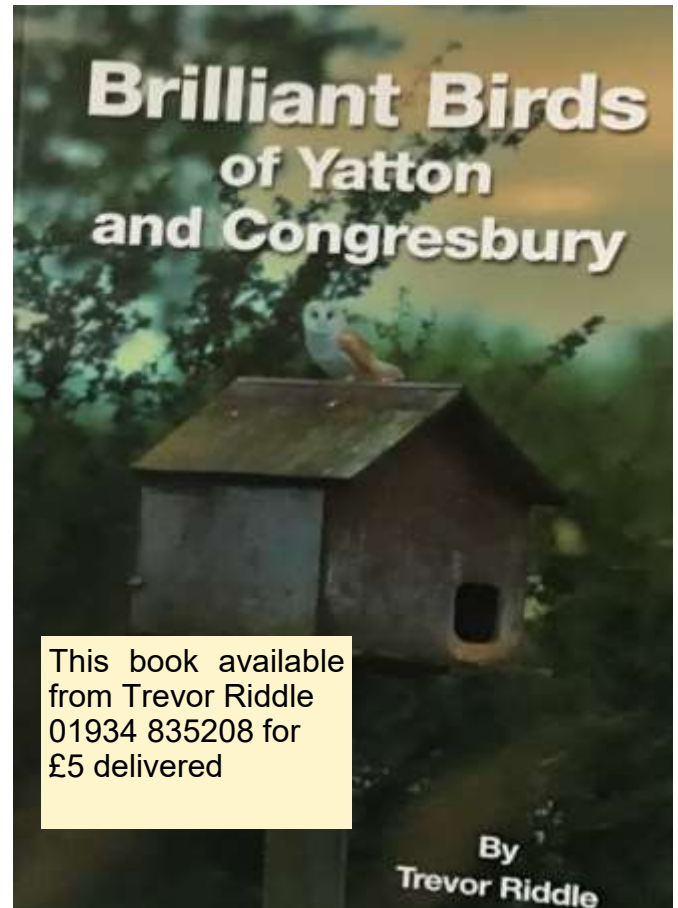

Bird News

The cold snap delayed Spring birdsong but as soon as it warmed up, Wrens, Dunnocks, Chaffinches and Greenfinches were singing. A Sand Martin has been reported from the Dowlais Farm area of Clevedon, a very early date. I heard a Great Spotted Woodpecker drumming on the 22nd. Parties of Lapwings headed south west seeking to escape the harsh weather on the 12th.

There were good numbers of Goosanders on the Blind Yeo at Clevedon along with a few Little Grebes. The YACWAG Littlewood Reserve hosted a party of at least 15 Siskins mid month, the first flock for a few years, but surprisingly they soon left. A group of ten Little Egrets were feeding amongst cattle in the Hilsea area of the moor. The field adjoining the houses at the Yatton end produced 30 Snipe with two Jack Snipe. One of the latter flew into a nearby garden, that would have been some garden tick!

Both Rob Treble and John Croxton reported a Black Redstart over several days towards the end of the month in the Kenn Street and Duck Lane area.

A Barn Owl was seen in the Wemberham Lane area of Yatton and there were a couple of Green Sandpipers on the River Yeo and a pair of Grey Wagtails. The local Kingfisher has survived the freeze and Ravens are constructing a typically huge stick nest on one of the pylons towards Kingston Seymour. Six overflying Greylag Geese was an unusual sight, probably another hard weather movement. Four Skylarks were in full song but Peregrines became less visible, probably already spending more time close to their nesting territories.



Lastly, YACWAG has just published a small book authored by yours truly describing local birds and their habitats, the book is available for £5 delivered. Please ring me on the number below if you are interested.

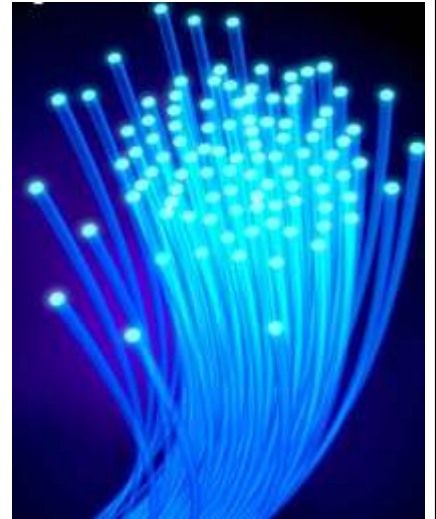

I have recently been lent a book from the Ray Naish collection about the coastal villages between Portishead and Burnham on Sea. I append the authors take on Kenn.

Theft from Motor vehicles

I'm sure you are aware recently we have had an increase of thefts of Catalytic convertors. Unfortunately we had 2 on the 11th and we believe an attempted one. Overnight on the 15th/16th we have had 2 more stolen on Stowey Road.

In all these cases it appears that the exhausts have been cut using a power tool.

The advice we have put on the beat pages is as follows:

“There are ways of making your catalytic converters safe with different devices clamps etc so we ask that you do your research.

We would advise to leave your vehicle in a well-lit area when parked or on a driveway with CCTV if possible, the equipment used to cut a catalytic converter is heavy duty and can be completed within minutes.”

Our Monthly Missive from The Limes

I'm finding it hard to believe that I've been writing articles for KN&V for a year now. They only started as an attempt to cheer up the village in the absence of anything of higher quality and judging by the occasional bit of feedback they may have succeeded in this, even if ever so slightly.

I also can't understand why apart from very slight mentions, the Parish Council have escaped my sights, but rest assured, that is all going to change this month.

Right at the start there are two points I need to clarify.

Firstly the current Parish Councillors and clerk are a very nice bunch, but please do not tell them I've said this in case it goes to their heads.

Note that I have said "the current Parish Councillors etc". The reason for this is that one of the drawbacks of democracy - and Churchill said democracy was the worst form of government but everything else had been tried - is that you don't get to choose your colleagues. The electorate usually do that for you and you have to be prepared to work with what you get. If you can't cope with that then don't stand for the post.

The other point to mention is that there is often confusion between local Parish Councils and the Church of England Parochial Church Councils or similar wording and the use of the term "Parishioners".

This is quite understandable as until the Local Government Act of 1894 it was the church Councils that were the local governing authorities. However this mode of government just didn't work and but it took many decades before the Local Government Act was passed and gave us the basis of what we still have today in terms of local government.

Actually the Act itself was very controversial. It had 800 amendments and took a year to get through Parliament. It set up Town and Parish Councils, although very small villages could decide to stay with the old system. Because Kenn was quite small, it is hard to say when Kenn Parish Council actually started.

So what is a Parish Council? A parish council is a civil local authority found in England and is the lowest tier of local government. They are elected corporate bodies, have variable tax raising powers, and are responsible for areas known as civil parishes, serving in total 16 million people.

There are several areas of powers that Parish Councils can exercise.

The first is a "duty to provide facilities". This is the only legal duty they have, the rest are discretionary and surprisingly there is only one legal duty and that is to provide allotments if there is demand.

In addition,

Parish councils may exercise powers to provide, maintain and manage certain facilities.

Here are a few examples:

Buildings for community use, such as village halls, town halls or community centres

Recreational facilities such as parks, playgrounds, playing fields and swimming baths.

Litter bins.

Maintenance of rights of way.

Guardianship of common land (such as village greens).

Maintenance of war memorials .

Bus shelters .

Provision, maintenance and protection of roadside verges.

Parish councils have the right to be consulted by the district, county council or unitary authority, for example on:

All planning applications in their areas.

Proposals to carry out sewerage works.

Footpath and bridleway (more generally, 'rights of way' surveys)

There are miscellaneous powers, e.g.:

Sponsoring public events

Cleaning and drainage of ponds, watercourses and ditches.

Power to obtain water from any well, spring or stream.

Creation of a neighbourhood plan.

Power to acquire or dispose of land

Also since the Localism Act in 2011, they can also do anything an individual can do provided it is not prohibited by other legislation

Unlike Town Councils, which are basically the same as Parish Councils but a bit bigger, we are non-political. Also Councillors are not volunteers, a point made strongly on a Local Councillor training course I attended. We are "elected holders of public office".

In fact there is more to it. Legally we are summoned to a meeting - not invited.

Technically you can't refuse, which does create a problem at times (for example I have a clash and can't make the next meeting) and if you skip meetings you can be sacked.

Councillors have to declare interests, both when they are appointed and also in a meeting if there may be something cropping up which could be construed as a conflict of interest. That means we have to be squeaky clean so please forgive us if we decline that bottle of brandy or holiday in the sun.

Sadly, it appears to be getting harder to fill councillor positions, not just in Parish Councils but also in Town Councils. I'm told that Clevedon has some unfilled positions right now and in the last local elections there were some parish councils in the area which only had half the number of candidates standing that were needed. That is a shame as the time commitment is not huge. It also means the electorate aren't really getting a choice in the composition of the council.

Unless there is a planning application we tend to meet every two months, and it doesn't require specialised knowledge. We are not meant to be experts in planning policies for example or be budding tree surgeons although we do tend to allocate specific areas of responsibility between us. For example my brief is broadband and community resilience.

The Clerk (who is employed by the council) can guide us on what we can and can't do. However we are there to get things done, whether we organise it ourselves or call in resources from North Somerset or elsewhere. In any event there are training courses for councillors that one can go on.

Parish Council meetings are open to the public. Currently we are using Zoom and details of meetings are on the two village noticeboards - and you do know where they are don't you? Also once a year we hold an Annual Parish Meeting (which will be coming up soon) where villagers can have their say about what they would like the Parish Council to do over the following year and the Parish Council to report what they have done in the preceding year. Please do come along. Some years we have had no-one turn up, which is a bit disconcerting.

This is probably the place to make the point that we can't solve all your problems and councillors on their own have no powers or authority. I sometimes have to think carefully whether to spell "Councillor" as I just have, or like "Counsellor". In practice there might not be much difference. Sometimes we may just be there to give advice or a shoulder to cry on, not that anyone has cried on my shoulder recently but then since February last year I've only had two hugs and one of them was from my sister in law.

Finally, this article can only give a very brief overview. I also want to acknowledge there is a lot in Kenn that is done by people outside of the Parish Council and that is great.

Nevertheless, please do support your Parish Councillors and the Parish Council. With continual cutbacks in North Somerset we know it can be difficult to get as much done as we would like and increasingly we are having to take on some jobs that North Somerset Council used to do. Also some issues have no easy solution - traffic through the village comes to mind, and sometimes a decision may not be popular.

Do come along to our meetings however - they are not boring.

If you receive a call claiming your National Insurance number has been compromised asking you to press a button on your keypad, please terminate the call.

Another Scam

A caller will state they are from BT, and you have an unsettled balance on your account of £****, and you will be disconnected if immediate payment if not made and the bill will rise when re-connected at a later date.

When challenged, they provide a false name, last used was 'John Peacock' and a strong foreign accent was detected, the caller states they can prove they are from BT and goes through a process where they pretend to disconnect the line momentarily.

The recipient is asked to end the call and try and call someone else which they find is not possible.

The reason this is not possible is the caller had initiated the call and only they can terminate, they simply mute the phone to make it appear they are not there, this gives the impression the line is dead.

When the Scam caller hears you stop trying to call out, they will clear the line and call you back giving the impression they have re-connected your line.

At this point you may feel reassured this is genuine, IT IS NOT.

Never hand over your bank details to someone that calls you out of the blue.

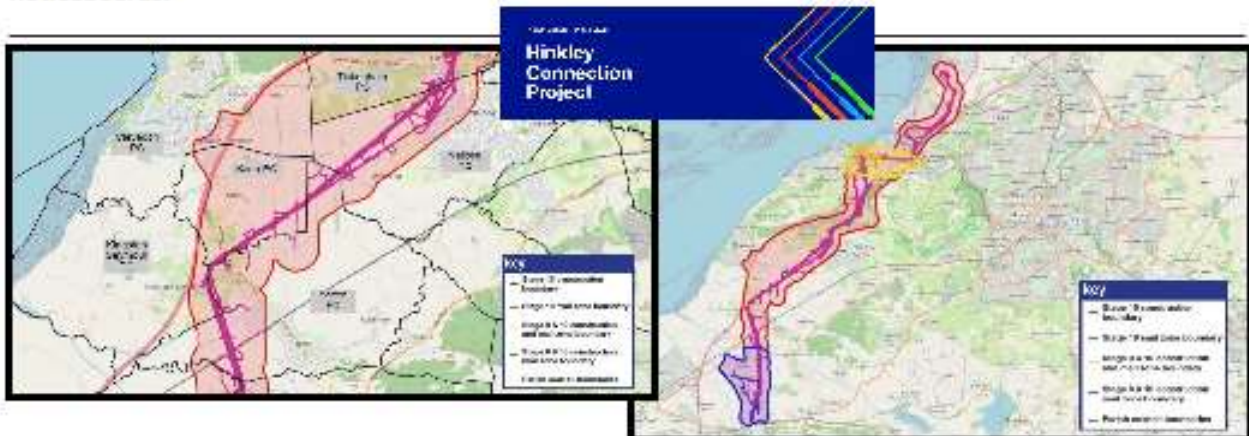
North Somerset Council will be providing flowers again this year.

Kenn Parish Council will receive the following plants:

- French Marigold Bonanza Series (or similar mixed)
- Salvia Mojave (or similar red)
- Petunia Grand Rapids (mixed)
- Lobelia Crystal Palace (or mixed)
- Cineraria maritima Silver Dust – Useful infill around edges of planters



When the Parish Council receive the date for collecting these from the contractors a notice for requesting and arranging collection of the plants will be put in the News & Views (if timing allows) and notices on the noticeboards.



Residents in category A (red shaded area within the red line) will receive information about existing work, the new T-pylons and removal of the WPD pylons from the A368 in Sandford to Avonmouth.

Residents in category B (blue shaded area within the blue line) will receive information about existing work, the new T-pylons and removal of the WPD pylons, and about changes to WPD's existing network - north west of Sandford substation towards Puxton.

Residents in category C (yellow shaded area within the yellow line) will receive relevant information about existing work, the new T-pylons and removal of the WPD pylons, and about work to replace WPD's pylons with underground cables to the east of Portishead substation in Portbury Wharf Nature Reserve.
