A donation of £5 per person goes towards the cost of the lunch and any leftover money is donated to the local food bank. Foodbank donation update next month!



🖁 Bird News

The main ornithological event of the month was the impressive Starling murmuration in Clevedon by **Tesco's store.**

I estimated 12,000 birds on the 5th with a few less on the 12th.

At least one Sparrowhawk was in attendance and the spectacle attracted a good number of watchers.

The birds are likely to disperse and return to Europe fairly soon.



The local moors were quiet but with a few flocks of Redwings and Fieldfares could be seen and there were some big gatherings of Gulls.

YACWAG's Kenn Moor Reserve had 15 roosting Snipe at the beginning of the month, a low count probably due to the dry weather.

A Kingfisher was there and also by the Little River. Mistle Thrushes were seen at Little River and at Brockley.

Eight Goosanders were on the River Yeo at Congresbury with a decent flock of Meadow Pipits nearby.

A Red Kite was unseasonal over Smallway Congresbury with a Woodcock on the slopes of Cadbury Hill where a flock of ten Siskins provided a welcome sight.

Finally a Lapland Bunting near the Kenn Estuary on the 24th was the rarest bird of the month in the Parish of Kenn and it's likely to be the rarest bird of 2023 in Kenn.



From a monthly trip to the collecting point it is now weekly. Thank you Kenn for this recycling.





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Lone Working Policy

This is a very short summary of the Church of England **'Lone Working Guidance'**

Firstly, we have a personal responsibility when alone when in or around church buildings, to take reasonable care of ourselves.



This includes thinking whether what we are about to do could be something that could cause us to be injured.

For instance, should we be standing on a chair or pew, or moving something unreasonably heavy or unwieldy?

Would it be better to ask someone to help?

It is ALWAYS advisable to let someone know that we are going to be alone in church, and to let them know when we leave the building.

Secondly, if an accident or incident occurs, even a minor one, one of the clergy, a churchwarden or Parish Safeguarding Officer **must** be told as soon as possible.

By doing that, the best help can be sought, a further risk assessment can be made, and possibly, further safeguards be put in place to prevent such a thing happening again.



Our own Sue Parker, musical director and pianist, will be playing the piano with special guests and you can rely on the cooking skills of the village to provide delicious cakes.



Colin George Cooper - 5th November 1935 — 15th January 2023

A Service of Thanksgiving for the Life of Colin George Cooper was held at St John the Evangelist, Kenn on Wednesday 8th February. The Revd. Fran Binding officiated and Jo Manning provided the musical accompaniment. Colin's family were supported by a large congregation of friends and neighbours.

Some thoughts from his son Chris - Colin was born in Hackney in London, the youngest of three children to Beatrice and William Cooper. Thanks to his sister Barbara's matchmaking Mum and Dad met in 1956 and married 5 years later. Their first home was in Dunstable, but a work opportunity with Bass Brewery in Bristol, brought Mum and Dad



into Congresbury and therefore into a lot of your lives. The area of Somerset meant a great deal to Dad with walking in the Quantocks and Mendips a favourite activity, so a brief spell in Hampshire soon had them rushing back, into Langford.



Perhaps Dad's greatest achievement was their next move to the current family home in Kenn, 44 years ago, where with the knowledge that he had from his profession as a property developer, he built Ilexmead. I have fond memories of helping with the construction or rather just being the labourer, such as off loading Stowell's wagon of dense concrete blocks by hand, or sanding endless lengths of timber. Dad took a great deal of satisfaction from the process and the home that it created for us all.

Over the years Dad enjoyed almost all sports. Cycling

with Mum, playing Tennis, Squash, Badminton and Table Tennis - playing well into his 70's at Clevedon Community Centre. As well as stamp collecting, he was a keen bridge player which he was able to do with Mum. Together they loved taking holidays, at home and abroad, most recently on cruises. My brother and I have fond memories of the many family day trips and holidays to Woolacombe and Cornwall where we were always playing in the sand and surf. I think walking in the hills with his dog beside him, sums up what Dad enjoyed doing most. Recently with Caspar, who now looks after Mum.

Sadly Dementia took control of Colin and he spent some of his last years in care.

It seems a long time since I last wrote an article for KN&V. The reason is very simple. It IS a long time since I wrote an article for KN&V. In a moment of inspiration in early January, soon after the last article, I sat down and wrote February's piece, and like good wine, left it to mature until it needed to be sent off.

As a result, a certain amount of inertia has crept in and I was tempted to leave it for this month. However the image of the worthy burghers of Kenn spilling their coffee in their laps in dismay, unbelief and disappointment at finding the only item left to read in KN&V was the Parish Council Notes was too much for me.

Therefore I am devoting this damp, drizzly Tuesday morning putting pen to paper – actually fingers to keyboard – to inform and amuse you and I hope you appreciate it.

It is extremely easy when writing a regular column to fall into the trap of using it to express opinions and to influence the thinking of others. I try to avoid that but am aware it is not particularly easy or in some cases, achievable.

My view is that if you want to be told what to think, read the Guardian or the Telegraph or some other publication depending on your persuasion. Most of them have writers who are employed to have strong views on certain subjects. However that is my opinion, so you can see I have failed again.

In general I try to regale you with fact based articles. Sometimes the facts are so stark that it is clear what to think and thus may well influence your opinions and conversations. In others the facts are just facts. For example my article about the composition of eggs and mating habits of poultry is hardly likely to feature in an exchange of views over the dinner table unless you are consuming an omelette.

Bearing all this in mind, this month I want to turn to the subject of roads.

Last week, coming home along the Tickenham road late at night, (yes I do get out at night), halfway along the road was a "Road closed ahead" sign, sadly with no clue as to what to do about it.

Thinking it might be one of those roads that are often open at night despite the sign, and being curious anyway I continued on. A bit later was another sign. Again no suggestion as to what to do, which is a pity as the Tickenham Road is an important thoroughfare and as there is no obvious alternative, people need all the help they can get.

It transpired that the road was closed a few hundred yards short of where it goes under the motorway. It was well and truly closed with cones and lights across the road, a vehicle blocking it and even a CCTV warning sign.

All it needed was blue flashing lights and a news camera crew.

Another road closure that affected me the other day was in Pill. (Yes, I do get to some odd places). A road had been closed for several days and when I drove along it the other night looking for changes, all I could find were a couple of speed bumps outside the school, virtually hidden by being black and it being night time with no warning signs. Needless to say, them being invisible, I found them the hard way.

So where is all this going? (I mean this article – not the roads which clearly are going nowhere).

It does seem that road closures are becoming the norm in the area and I've mentioned before the mental gymnastics required to work out how to get from A to B.

So why have we so many road closures? There are several reasons and they broadly fall into two groups. One is utilities and the other is road repair. I'll come back to the first in moment, the second is so rare it's not worth considering.

But why close the roads? The answer generally is it is more efficient in theory to get the job done in one go than piecemeal. Also there is the health and safety aspect, (certainly I would not like to be some of the men working on the roads) and finally sometime it just can't be done any other way.

The last two points are valid. The problem with the first one is that it requires efficient planning and organisation. We have all seen instances where nothing seems to happen and the work has just halted.

To be fair a lot of work is done without closures. We just have traffic lights and delays instead but at least with patience we can get through. For a number of years Clevedon has been subject to upheaval while the gas pipes in the town have been replaced. I don't recollect any roads being closed but I may be wrong.

The next source of upheaval is broadband. That affected our country lanes and some time ago I wrote a light hearted article tracing the route of Truespeed's and Gigaclear's routes across the moor. Now Truespeed have expanded into the local towns upheaval there will carry on for some time.

Another source is building sites. The Tickenham Road has been badly affected by building on the two Roundtrees sites. They need water, electricity, drains etc and traffic lights have come and gone on that road for years.

More roadworks are planned and I have been told it will be closed totally in May for 3 weeks but I have not had that confirmed, so again, I may be wrong.

The final reason for closures will probably upset some folk as,

a) it is not what you want to hear, and

b) it will challenge your thinking, as ideology faces facts and reality.

The cause is electric vehicles, about which I will say I have mixed views.

I was brought up in the days of electric milk floats and the advantages of them were clear. They were relatively silent, the bottles making more noise than the vehicle and they were efficient.

However, encouraging everyone to move to electric cars is going to create a whole host of problems. Space here does not allow me to go into the eco issues (which are not as clear cut as many think) but I can say we do not have an infrastructure to support them. To put it bluntly we do not currently have enough electricity generation in this country to support wide scale use of electric vehicles or the ability to get it where needed in the volume required.

Both may be surmountable eventually but certainly putting in the large capacity cables for charging stations is an immense task. Most homes nowadays have an electric connection capable of supplying 100Amps. To charge a car to go nearly 40 miles will take about 50Amps for an hour (at a rough cost of £5 if 40p per unit) and most home supplies should accommodate that. The sting in the tail is that when electrical distribution systems are designed they are designed on the basis that not everyone is going to take large amounts of power at the same time so if you all go home and plug your cars in to charge at once there will be problems.

Fast charging points at garages are totally different and require vast amounts more of current, usually delivered at a higher voltage and possibly with a small substation alongside.

If as a result of electric vehicles, it is required that distribution cables are upgraded, you will find it is not a five minute job. Unlike broadband where you dig a small trench, put the cable in and fill it and move on, electricity cables are a much slower installation process.

The 3 or 4 way traffic lights in Clevedon where the Portishead road joins were in place for weeks. The reason, I am informed, was that it was for new electricity cables for the BP garage for EV charging points.

The roadworks along Kenn Road and through the Kenn Moor Drive housing estate are also for new power lines for one of the industrial units (although possibly not for charging) and these works have been going on for months.

Therefore be prepared for many more years of disruption on our roads.

Of course if you believe the North Somerset Council website and the media, we should all walk, cycle or use the bus, whatever our age or health or disabilities or reason for travel. I may address that parallel universe another time.
