

I shall miss Mike very much, but as I often feel the presence of all those who have gone before as I lift the bread as part of the communion prayer in church, so when I look at my computer screen to welcome those who have joined Morning Prayer, I will welcome Mike in my heart and continue to be grateful for his company. May he rest in peace and rise eternal.

Leslie Michael Callow 'Mike' 18th January 1930–21st July 2023

A service of thanksgiving for the life of Mike Callow was held at St John the Evangelist, Clevedon on Monday 14th August, following a private cremation. The service was led by Father Brendan Clover and Prebendary John Andrews who kindly shared his words, some of which follow.

Mike was born Leslie Michael Callow 93 years ago Warwickshire. He had a twin sister and a brother, both of who died before him.

He was educated at Meriden School and the technical college in Coventry and worked in the offices of Triumph Motorcycles which later became part of BSA after a takeover.



It was while he was at Triumph that Iris, who also worked there, caught his eye. They would meet at lunchtime and became good friends. Friendship blossomed into love and they were married in 1956 in St Mary Magdalen Church, Coventry.

In 67 years of happy marriage they were greatly blessed with two children – Mark (who is married to Helen) and Sarah (married to Clive) – and five grandchildren – Andrew, Edward, Eleanor, Robert and Isabel.

The family moved to Clevedon in 1972 when Mike's job took him to aerospace, and four years later they moved to Kenn.

Mike was always a Churchman and he served this Church as a Churchwarden, a member of the Church Council, and a bell ringer. Here in Clevedon he was a pastoral visitor and often took Home Communion to people including some who lived in retirement homes.

In his service to the community Mike was a driver for Meals on Wheels and was an active member of a classical music group to listen, appreciate and discuss some of the best music ever written.

So though he retired 33 years ago he remained fully occupied and VERY busy.

Some years ago Mike and Iris started to go to Kenn Church but also continued to worship, from time to time, in this Church (particularly on a Friday morning) and at Kingston Seymour Church.

Many of us will remember Mike particularly as an enthusiastic and skilled bell ringer and until just a few years ago he continued to climb the perilously steep ladder to ring the bells here.

He also rang at Kingston Seymour, at Congresbury and the single bell at Kenn. He was even lucky enough to be able to ring at the Cathedrals in Wells, Bristol and Gloucester as well as most of the other English Cathedrals. His idea of a perfect holiday was one where he could find a Church willing to let him loose on their ropes. He'd arrive somewhere and perhaps the first thing he'd do would be to look around for a promising Church tower and some indication of who he should talk to.

He even managed to find bells to ring when holidays took him to Canada and South Africa.

To many this would seem like an all consuming hobby – Iris once remarked that sometimes she felt like a bell ringing widow. But for Mike it was so much more than just a hobby, more than just a pleasurable leisure activity.

It was even more than just announcing a service was about to start and more than calling people to worship. To Mike bell ringing was itself an act of worship and an act of praise, it was an act of witness proclaiming the truth of the Gospel for all to hear, it was a prayer and a hymn. It wasn't an obsession – it was a ministry to be exercised diligently, regularly, faithfully. His enthusiasm was for the Gospel.

Away from the bells Mike enjoyed walking in the countryside as one of a group of three elderly gentlemen – He used to describe the Group as the Last of the Summer Wine. Today we must bring to mind the many good things we've enjoyed together with Mike in life - treasured moments of shared happiness – times of difficulty overcome - moments of sorrow soothed. JA

Bird News


A Tawny Owl and its youngster paid a visit to a Kingston Seymour garden at the end of June and posed very close to the house on a garden umbrella.

Barn Owls are still active around the YACWAG Reserves and a Little Owl was calling at the Stowey Reserve quite close to nearby houses.

It has been a quiet month generally but Green Woodpeckers were very vocal and reported calling from five local sites.

House Martins seem to be prospering on the new houses in Yatton with a couple of reports of 20 birds

there. Later in the month there were 30+ on Congresbury Moor plus a single late Swift on the 21st. A pair of Stonechats, and three Whitethroats were present there and a couple of Skylarks flew over.



A walk around Kenn Moor (24th) yielded another Wheatear and a nice view of a Little Egret and a Great White Egret perched together on a gate - little and large. There were a couple of Grey Herons too - not so long ago the prospect of seeing three heron species on Kenn Moor would have seemed fanciful.

Our Monthly Missive from the Limes

I must start this month by saying how stunning the wild flower display is at Kenn Pier. It looks great when you drive past but you really need to stop and get out and go up close to it to see how absolutely fantastic it is. Many of the flowers are quite vivid and have a beauty of their own. How long it will remain good I don't know so do go soon.

It transpires that a different wildflower mix has been used this year, resulting in later blooming. I think that has worked well since with the very good weather earlier this year many gardens were in danger of all their bloom finishing the season early with nothing to replace them.

When I saw the display at Kenn Pier I remarked that it would be nice to have another site like that locally – (yes I know we have the village green the other end of Kenn but it is the other end of Kenn and some of us live our lives without going there without good cause – not that we have anything against the good citizens of that part of Kenn so please don't get the wrong idea). I suggested that it would be a good plan to put a roundabout at the junction of Kenn Street and Kenn Moor Road with a wild flower garden in the middle.

The response of course was that there isn't enough room, and that is quite true. However it did start a train of thought of various ideas on things I'd like to see, which I'll share with you later. Don't worry if you disagree with me, I'll cope.

So going back to a roundabout at the end of Kenn Street, the idea is not as crazy as you might think. I can come up with several powerful arguments in its favour. Yes, it's true there is not currently much room but money in a farmer's bank account might offset losing a few square yards of field. It would certainly be a better use of money than long term kerb works in Yatton or wavy lines in Clevedon.

The existing junction is not safe for walkers and would benefit from changes. I have mentioned before that I have been hit by cars along Kenn Moor Road, - not that anyone has seemed overly concerned but I thought I'd let you know in case you want to give me sympathy. Walkers don't know what is coming along and traffic can go fast. A roundabout will slow traffic down enormously and you can make it large enough that farm vehicles can get past but 40 ton lorries can't.

The other benefit is that it gives an opportunity to refurbish the vintage road sign there. It is in dire need of love and attention and preservation but that does present problems and no-one from North Somerset Council down seems willing to grasp the proverbial nettle. In an ideal world you'd prop ladders against it and men with wire brushes would clean it up and paint it. Clearly now we have progressed from horse and cart to motor cars that is not a safe option unless you join the traffic light club and put temporary 2 or 3 way traffic lights up and get your own back on Yatton and Clevedon.

The option that is preferred is to take it up and move it to an engineering company who can do all the work necessary and then replant it. However there is a gas main in the vicinity (I have the route the gas board gave me somewhere in my files) and 2 fibre optic cable ducts and goodness knows what else, so no-one wants to lift it and find other things come up with it. As a result we have a bit of a stalemate unless the parish council have managed to find a solution since I departed.

Anyway enough on that. Some time ago there was a magazine which ran a series of articles on "If I ruled the world". I think it was Readers Digest and that series came to mind as my thoughts wandered onto what else would I like to see in Kenn if I ruled the world and could get things done?

I have mentioned before I'd like to see a small playground in Kenn with at least swings and a slide. At the moment if I want to have a go on a swing I have to go to the playground at Salthouse and hope no-one is looking. There's a small playground just off Valley Road and if you want to see what really can be done just go to Tickenham Village hall and have a walk around. It's very impressive.

If I ruled the world I would put a footpath across to the Village Hall or Duck Lane area from Kenn Moor road or Kenn Pier. Depending how you read the old maps there are indications something was there years ago. It would be really great to be able to cut across to the village away from traffic.

Here's another one, although it might actually have happened: The lights at the Hand Stadium have been a nuisance ever since they were put up and they dazzle motorists along Davis Lane. In fact the lights can be seen from the air when flying into Bristol airport from the Bath direction! Anyway at a Parish Council meeting I mentioned it as a pet moan and asked if something could be done. I never heard the outcome but yesterday when I drove past The Hand I glanced up and saw that many of the light fitments have gone. Whether that means a more scientific approach to lighting has taken place I don't know. We will have to wait until the nights draw in more.

Almost finally – I'd do something about traffic in Yatton. For reasons I'm not going to go into Yatton does not have a bypass and it not likely to for the foreseeable future. Driving through Yatton is something I have to psyche myself up for and certainly is not an enjoyable experience. There is talk of a 20mph limit through the village. My view is that is great if you will guarantee I can do 20mph through Yatton, otherwise don't bother. It is like the speed limit signs on the M5 near Avonmouth in the summer saying 40 or 50mph when you are stationary in traffic – someone's ideas of a bad joke. Anyway, despite slagging off the interminable roadworks in Yatton, one unexpected side benefit was that the temporary traffic lights did make it easier and less stressful to drive through. I would be very tempted to bring them back permanently.


Finally – just reading through what I have written it seems largely traffic related, which was not my intention, so let me leave you with one final suggestion.

25 Local residents attended to express their concerns about aspects of this application. The Parish Council listen to these and incorporated some in their decision for reporting to North Somerset Council, as follows:

Although the application site is close to Clevedon it is nevertheless entirely within the boundary of Kenn. The Parish Council therefore has a duty to ensure that the proposed development, if allowed, will contribute to sustainable development and safe environment of a thriving 'rural' community.

DM1 - Flooding and drainage.

Kenn Parish Council's comments: The application site is within a recognised flood zone. However, Kenn Parish Council acknowledges the application site was allocated as an employment site within the Sites and Policies Plan Part 2 (SSP Policy SA4 - Employment Allocations).

DM53 - Employment Development on greenfield sites in the countryside:

Kenn Parish Council's comments: With the above in mind Kenn Parish Council, along with recent consultations with Kenn residents at a very well attended public meeting, consider that the proposed takeaway outlet and hotel (as was contained within the 50 documents that no longer appear to be on the North Somerset website) are not appropriate in a rural community. Furthermore, please note, this is a greenfield site, not a brownfield site as it is sometime defined as.

DM24 - Safety, traffic and provision of infrastructure, etc. associated with development.

Kenn Parish Council's comments: There have always been concerns expressed about highway conflicts in this vicinity. There needs to be a study of the impact of increased traffic from large scale developments (existing and proposed) on the local rural and urban area, also traffic from the motorway accessing local routes. With regard to the site's junction access to the B3133 there are visibility issues for vehicles travelling in either direction along the B3133 – which, as already mentioned, has increased substantially in recent years due to the large-scale developments in Yatton.

DM71 – <u>Development contributions</u>, <u>Community Infrastructure Levy and viability</u>.

Kenn Parish Council's comments: The Parish Council wishes to be involved in discussions concerning the content of the Community Infrastructure Levey and Section 106 agreements, also wishes to be consulted again on any amendments made to the proposed development proposals as part of the submitted outline planning application.

<u>Finally:</u> Kenn Parish Council wishes its comments to past applications for this site, 23/P/0892/EA1, 16/P/1901/O and 13/P/1729/O, that are still relevant, to be considered in conjunction with this application. If the proposed development is considered acceptable by North Somerset Council in principle, Kenn Parish Council would wish to be involved in the production of any masterplan for the proposed site (M32: High quality design and place-making).
